There is disagreement about which river is the biggest in the world. But it's definitely either the Nile or the Amazon. The

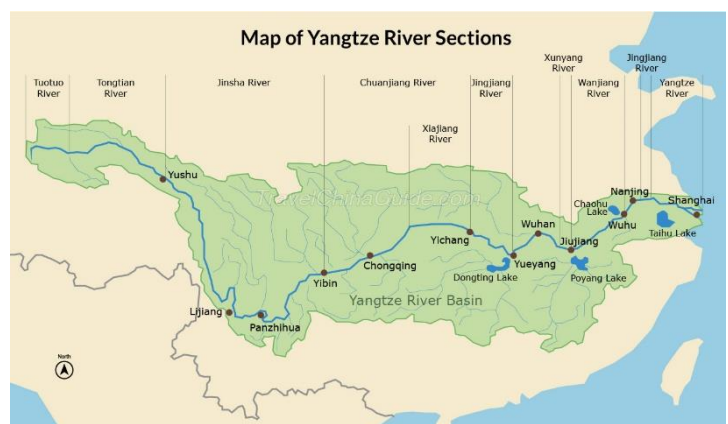
